#### Review of our December Concert

This was the first concert that the orchestra had played in the Great Hall Dulwich College and this made for some acoustic difficulties.

In the Rossini overture, "William Tell", the opening solo 'cellos had a spacious quality, yet the trombones in the Storm section sounded distant. The timps had a problem being placed against the panelling and were too strong throughout. In the Pastoral section the duet between the cor anglais and flute was very pleasing, despite some sharpness from the flute. The strings (especially the violins) did extremely well in the final gallop and Rossini's infectious exuberance came over well.

In the Tchaikovsky piano concerto the arrangement of the hall meant that the piano had to remain on the stage, with the orchestra below. Although the physicality of the dramatic writing was missing the aural effect was still present and the piano was easily heard above the orchestra. The soloist took some time to settle and to being alone on stage – missing some of his flourishes - however, he did settle to the slow movement with soft, tender and yet playful playing. The finale felt rushed - but I suppose he has plenty of years in which to slow down!

Schumann's "Rhenish" symphony showed the brass to be at their most secure, and the tempo of the 1<sup>st</sup> movement evoked the strong current of the river. The lyricism and lilt of the Landler Scherzo was also enhanced by a flowing tempo and the semiquavers had a lightness that added contrasting colour. The slow movement had gentle warmth with some nice phrasing in the wind but the solemn fugetta, with a well-controlled alto trombone, was the most effective. Again, the tempo relations were carefully judged by Julian. The finale was light and effervescent with some splendid trumpet playing.

## An article from our Librarian

If you've ever wondered where the music we play each week comes from, then read on ...

As the orchestra doesn't have a library of its own we have to borrow the music from other libraries.

Once the committee has decided on the programme for the coming year, my job as librarian is to find out what is available and check up on costs. At this stage we might find that we have to change the programme if music isn't available or if the costs are prohibitive.

There are a number of music libraries around the country that I use. My local public library in Croydon has been very helpful in sourcing orchestral sets for us at an incredible £1 per set. Unfortunately, due to cuts, Croydon no longer provides this service for music groups from outside the borough. I am currently checking whether Lambeth public libraries can do the same.

Much of the music we play is by composers who are long dead. This is due to copyright on a work which lasts for seventy years after the death of a composer and publishers continue to charge hefty hire fees for playing some of their works. For example, the fees for this term's Sibelius and Rodrigo mean that our budget won't stretch to hiring the Moeran symphony for next term. However, the committee does try to factor these costs into the budget to ensure that we are able to play a good range of music.

#### Our responsibility

Like a cracked record, I ask each term that you sign for your music part if you want to take it away with you. This is because we have a responsibility for the safe return of all the parts and will be charged the replacement costs for any sets returned with missing parts.

It has been a while since we last lost a part, but retrieving music sometimes entails a fair amount of chasing around and guesswork, so please ensure that you sign for your music. (Please ask me if you are unsure of the part number on the front of your music – there can sometimes be a fair amount of scribble!)
